WHY? To prevent a secondary disease of botulism.

WHY? To prevent further spread of a disease to other livestock and possibly humans, only if it is infectious/communicable. See your doctor for any and all serious illnesses.

WHY? To comply with Navajo Nation laws for livestock, equine, animals, ratite, and poultry; including solid waste disposal and other environmental laws, or begin the penalty process.

NOTE: Feral animals are the responsibility of a Chapter. Any Chapter (i.e., Land-Use Planning Committee) must identify burial locations on emergency basis, and work with the local grazing official. Deaths include natural causes, road fatalities, or sickness.
